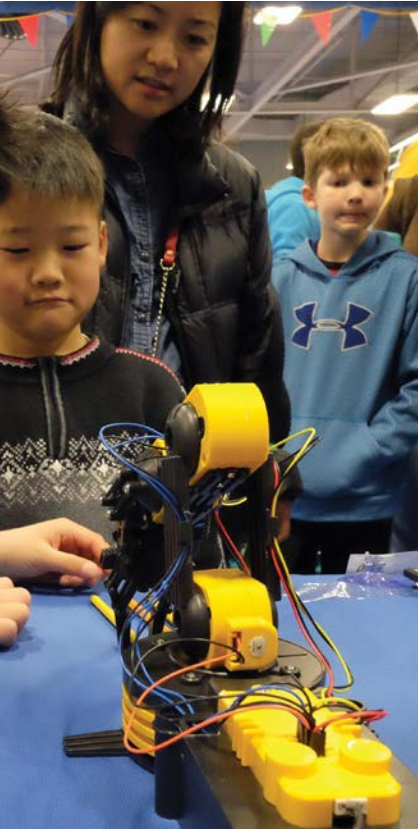

Community leadership is a core competency of the Community Foundation for Northern Virginia. Our work goes well beyond the award of grants to help meet critical community needs. We view our mission as nothing short of becoming the “go-to” place for donors and funders as they consider how to do good in Northern Virginia. To this end, we accomplished much in 2014 and are very pleased to share it with you in the pages of this Annual Report.

We helped donors think differently about their philanthropy. The Community Foundation co-presented a donor education event in April with the Giving Circle of HOPE that featured author and senior advisor with the Foundation Strategy Group, Leslie Crutchfield, and her recent book “Do More Than Give.” Alongside a panel of local experts, Ms. Crutchfield helped educate Community Foundation donors about ways they can structure their philanthropy, advocacy, and participation in cross sector collaborations to make the biggest possible difference.

We commissioned and published two extensive, data driven research studies on critical needs, one on the needs of our aging population and the other on the support network available to our military veterans and their families. These reports helped clarify philanthropy’s role in addressing the most critical needs for these populations and led to the formation of funding collaboratives and community convenings to support future action.

We increased our focus on STEM education and entrepreneurship through the launch of the Business Women’s Giving Circle to support the educational and business interests of girls and women. We also built on the continuing success of our Future Fund for young professionals, through service projects, social events, and a grant cycle to support military veterans and their families. The Loudoun Impact Fund continued its important work to support at risk children and youth in Loudoun County.

We supported innovative, new initiatives that help diversify the local economy and promote creative thinking through our Innovation Fund. This fund helped George Mason University students and graduates develop

and launch new entrepreneurial ventures. In addition, we were a founding partner and premier sponsor of Northern Virginia’s inaugural Mini Maker Faire, an event in Reston that attracted 3,000+ attendees and featured hands-on projects for adults and children, new inventions, tools and gadgets to help inspire the next generation of “makers” in the region.

Growing and sustaining a healthy and thriving community is an important and ever growing focus for the Community Foundation. As we continue our community leadership role, we encourage you to join us in 2015 as donors and co-investors in building a better future for Northern Virginia.

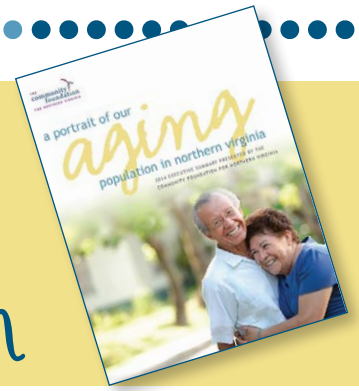

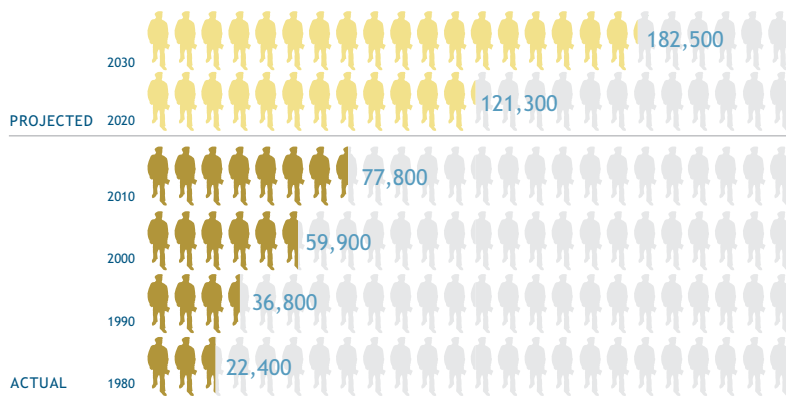
A PORTRAIT OF OUR AGING POPULATION IN NORTHERN VIRGINIA

In January, the Community Foundation published “A Portrait of our Aging Population in Northern Virginia,” highlighting the demographic, social and economic trends that impact older adults, ages 65 and over, in Northern Virginia. It uses extensive data and population projections to identify current needs and to plan for future needs of this population, expected to grow by 76% in the next twenty years.

KEY FINDINGS:

- By 2030, over 15% of the region’s population will be 65 or older.
- More than 20,000 older Northern Virginians currently live in poverty.
- The rate of older adults without health insurance in Northern Virginia is about three times higher than the national and Virginia rates.
- Demand for assisted living services has more than doubled over the last two decades.
- The cost of assisted living in Northern Virginia is beyond the means of thousands of older residents who would benefit from this service.

COMMUNITY FOUNDATION RESPONSE:

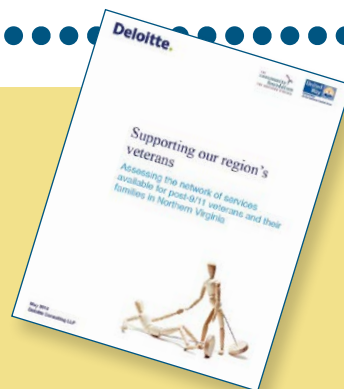
The data indicates a need to support seniors aging in place. In response, the Community Foundation made a grant of \$10,000 to support the Community Mobility: Northern Virginia Rides Program which provides transportation options to Northern Virginians who would not otherwise have mobility access, by offering a coordinated volunteer-driver transportation model to community groups. This initiative was developed by the Jewish Community Center of Northern Virginia in partnership with the Jewish Council for the Aging, Fairfax County Long Term Care Coordinating Council, the Giving Circle of HOPE, Volunteer Fairfax, representatives of community nonprofit social service providers, and the Community Foundation for Northern Virginia.

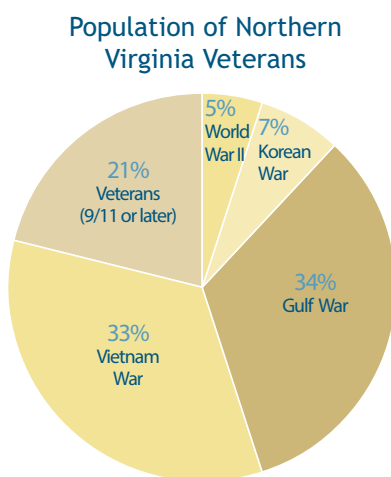

The Community Foundation commissioned and published two data driven reports in 2014 to help inform donors and funders, inspire meaningful dialogue, and increase philanthropic and public investment surrounding critical community needs.



SUPPORTING OUR REGION'S VETERANS

In June, the Community Foundation released “Supporting Our Region’s Veterans” in partnership with the United Way of the National Capital Area. Deloitte Consulting invested over \$80,000 in pro-bono research and writing services on the report, leveraging their considerable skills, knowledge and dedication to this cause. The report thoroughly assesses the demographics and network of support services available for post-9/11 war veterans, transitioning service members, and military families in the Northern Virginia region.

KEY FINDINGS:

- Veterans in Northern Virginia find services to be overly complex and difficult to access.
- Greater coordination between government and nonprofit providers to create a seamless web of services would improve the lives of veterans and military families.
- Northern Virginia veterans have access to a wide variety of government and nonprofit services, and are well supported at the macro-level.
- More support is needed to coordinate available services at the micro-level.

COMMUNITY FOUNDATION RESPONSE:

The Community Foundation awarded a grant of \$33,000 from the Military Personnel and their Families Fund to the Mental Health Association of Montgomery County’s (MHA) “Serving Together” Program. The grant supported MHA’s capacity to build its online service coordination platform and peer navigation service for veterans in Northern Virginia.

The Community Foundation has publicly committed to long-term support of Northern Virginia’s military veterans by joining over 30 philanthropic organizations and corporations through the Philanthropy-Joining Forces Impact Pledge, a national initiative with pledges totaling more than \$170 million over the next five years to support veterans and military families.

In 2014, the Community Foundation launched the Business Women's Giving Circle for women to collaborate on their philanthropy in support of programs that prepare women and girls in Northern Virginia for business success.

In keeping with the global movement to promote the educational and business interests of girls and women, and informed by research that demonstrates women are key to a healthy, thriving and prosperous economy, the vision of the Business Women's Giving Circle is to become THE source of knowledge, strategic giving, and advocacy for girls and women in Northern Virginia.

The Giving Circle's founding members include women who are noted business leaders and owners, board members of local chambers of commerce and nonprofit boards of directors, and others who are keenly interested in joining with their peers to support programs and organizations in Northern Virginia that promote business innovation, STEM education and entrepreneurship programs for women and girls.

Each member contributes an annual membership fee of \$1,100 that is pooled for grantmaking.

DO MORE THAN GIVE: HOW DONORS MAXIMIZE PHILANTHROPIC IMPACT

In April, the Community Foundation for Northern Virginia partnered with the Giving Circle of HOPE to present “Do More Than Give: How Donors Maximize Philanthropic Impact.” This program was designed to engage donors and funders in the Northern Virginia region in a discussion of catalytic philanthropy – an active approach to supporting a cause and making an impact beyond financial support.

Leslie Crutchfield, author of “Do More Than Give: The Six Practices of Donors Who Change the World”, and senior advisor with the Foundation Strategy Group, was the keynote speaker. Her book provides a blueprint for philanthropists to increase the impact of their gifts through active community engagement. In it, Crutchfield highlights six practices that take philanthropy from check-writing to proactively producing change.

The program included a panel discussion with three local philanthropists who practice this type of engaged philanthropy. **Dr. Alan Harbitter** serves as a board member of the Medical Care for Children Partnership (MCCP) Foundation – a unique partnership between the Fairfax County government, the medical community, and private contributors to provide health care for the children of working poor families in Fairfax County. **Diana Katz** is a co-founder and member of the Giving Circle of HOPE and serves on the boards of Empowered Women International, Inc., Computer CORE and Nonprofit Northern Virginia. **Kristin Pauly**, managing director of Prince Charitable Trusts in Washington, DC, serves as co-chair of the Chesapeake Bay Funders Network and of the Washington Regional Convergence Partnership.



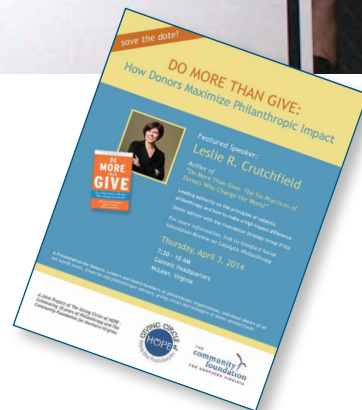


THE GIVING CIRCLE OF HOPE

The Giving Circle of HOPE, a giving circle at the Community Foundation for Northern Virginia, seeks to create positive change in the community through engaged and collective philanthropy. Members combine time, talents and money and collectively decide how to use these resources to impact a specific cause or interest area.

2014 marked the Giving Circle of HOPE's 10th anniversary of helping people in need in Northern Virginia by issuing annual grants, providing direct service through ongoing service programs, and hosting community events to benefit nonprofit partners.

The Giving Circle of HOPE awarded \$73,050 to 11 Nonprofit Partners in Northern Virginia in 2014. Grants support programs that encourage job creation, help build strong families, and assist community members in need.



LEADING *through innovation*

The Community Foundation's Innovation Fund recognizes and promotes innovation and supports programs that nurture inventiveness, creativity and new design across Northern Virginia. Its members represent a cross-section of innovative fields, including technologists, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) educators, philanthropists and entrepreneurs.

Two major initiatives were launched in the region with the help of grants from the Innovation Fund.



MASON INNOVATION LAB

In September, the Innovation Fund awarded \$25,000 to help launch the Mason Innovation Lab at the George Mason University School of Business. The Lab provides students and graduates of George Mason the opportunity to develop and launch new business ideas across many industry sectors with both product and service offerings.

Students are selected to participate in the lab through a competitive admissions process. Teams of undergraduate and graduate students complete an innovation and entrepreneurship curriculum, receive dedicated space in the Lab, work with experts and mentors, and participate in activities designed to launch their business.

NORTHERN VIRGINIA'S INAUGURAL MINI MAKER FAIRE

The Innovation Fund was a founding partner and sponsor of **Northern Virginia's inaugural Mini Maker Faire**, held in March at South Lakes High School and Hughes Middle School in Reston, VA. The Faire brought together inventors, hackers, crafters, artists, and DIY'ers from across the region to demonstrate and collaborate with Faire-goers to make things, new inventions, tools, and gadgets. More than 100 booths featured "makers" ages 12 to 92, offering hands-on projects for adults and kids of all ages. A few of the unusual mix of projects and activities included aluminum aerogami (a combination of origami and model airplane building from aluminum cans), 3D scanning and printing, solar-powered car, hand-spinning yarn, and spy gadgets from the International Spy Museum.

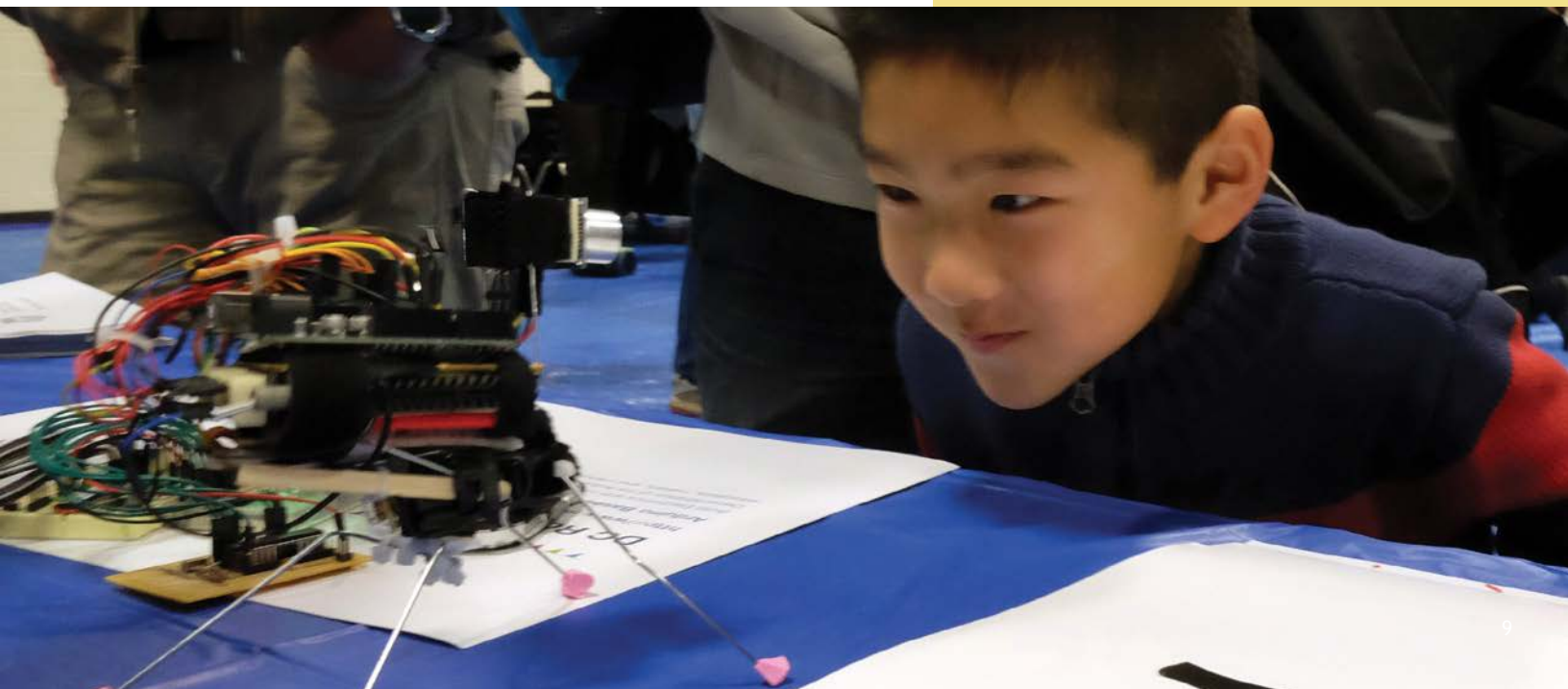

The Community Foundation for Northern Virginia helps meet the most critical needs of the community by supporting nonprofit organizations through discretionary grant cycles. In 2013-2014, the Community Foundation awarded a total of \$506,643 in discretionary grants to 73 nonprofits. These grants enable organizations to change lives.

Community Investment Fund Grants

CHILD AND YOUTH DEVELOPMENT FUND -

supports positive youth development programs that provide opportunities to children and youth who may be at risk due to poverty.

Audubon Naturalist Society, \$2,500*

Serving Loudoun County

Funding supported Nature R.O.C.K.s, an outdoor, afterschool program that is both healthy and academically enriching for 30-35 elementary school children from low-income communities in Leesburg, Virginia.

Casa Chirilagua, \$6,760

Serving Alexandria

Funding supported Kids Club "Exposure and Experience" Field Trips for at-risk children in the Latino neighborhood of Chirilagua through this afterschool program utilizing best-practice models to improve math and reading skills, ensure homework completion, and improve grades in school.

CASA CIS, \$10,000*

Serving Prince William County

Funding helped provide a court appointed child advocate to every child who is abused, neglected or abandoned in Prince William County and Manassas to ensure each child is protected and placed in a safe and permanent home.

Community Lodgings, \$10,000

Serving Alexandria

Funding supported the academic and behavioral needs of the nearly 200 low-income and homeless youth enrolled in two afterschool and summer education programs that provide individualized tutoring, enrichment, mentoring and parental support.

Fairfax Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), \$2,500

Serving Fairfax County

Funding provided trained volunteers to advocate for the best interests of 450 abused and neglected children under the Court's protection.

The House, Inc., \$10,000*

Serving Prince William/Fairfax

Funding supported out-of-school programs of The House, Inc. Student Leadership Center that help ensure participants graduate from high school with college access and workforce readiness.

The Reading Connection, \$7,500

Serving Arlington/Alexandria

Funding provided at-risk children with a weekly Read-Aloud program and free books, and offer Reading Family Workshops to their parents to increase their literacy/ language development and improve their ability to read to their children.

United Methodist Family Services, \$10,000

Serving Alexandria/Fairfax

Funding helped prevent youth in foster care from aging out of the system into homelessness, poverty, unemployment, and crime by matching those children with adult advocates to ensure their future success and stability.

EDUCATION FUND - supports English language proficiency programs for non-English speaking children and/or their parents, specifically early childhood education programs for children from low/moderate income families.

All Ages Read Together, \$10,000*

Serving Loudoun County

Funding helped provide intergenerational reading and school readiness preparation for disadvantaged pre-school aged children.

BEACON for Adult Literacy, \$10,000*

Serving Prince William County

Funding supported ESOL instruction to low-income, lowest-language level adult immigrants in Prince William County through eight learning centers.

Falls Church-McLean Children’s Center, \$3,000

Serving Fairfax County

Funding supported a culturally-sensitive and effective dual language learning program to help young children from immigrant families build English-language skills to prepare them for kindergarten, build social skills, and avoid an achievement gap in school.

The Literacy Lab, \$10,000

Serving Alexandria

Funding provided low-income, pre-kindergarten children in Alexandria with a year of daily literacy intervention, preparing them for success throughout their academic careers.

Literacy Volunteers of America - Prince William, Inc., \$10,000*

Serving Prince William County

Funding supported vital adult and computer literacy services for 475 ESOL adult learners to help develop or improve English skills in support of improving access to employment opportunities.

Loudoun Literacy Council, \$10,000*

Serving Loudoun County

Funding helped improve early literacy for at-risk children in Loudoun County and help end the intergenerational cycle of illiteracy by providing reading and literacy support for families in need.

ReSET, \$10,000

Serving All of Northern Virginia

Funding helped spark enthusiasm and motivation for science learning and careers in PreK-6th grade students in Northern Virginia through hands-on, inquiry-based activities, presented by volunteer scientists and engineers.

Young Playwrights’ Theater, \$5,000

Serving Arlington County

Funding supported an In-School Playwriting Program for students at Wakefield High School and Claremont Immersion School, integrating the art of playwriting into the classroom, with a special focus of reaching students who are English Language Learners.

HEALTH, MENTAL HEALTH AND AGING FUND -

supports programs that improve access to health care for those who are un- or under-insured, and services for people with disabilities. This fund also supports programs that serve Northern Virginia's elderly populations, particularly those who are low income or vulnerable.

Access Hope, \$10,000

Serving All of Northern Virginia

Funding provided enhanced access to mental health services for uninsured students at Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA).

Arlington Free Clinic, \$10,000

Serving Arlington County

Funding supported comprehensive, patient-centered medical services for low-income, uninsured adults in Arlington County who have no other options for regular, quality care.

The Culmore Clinic, \$8,896

Serving Fairfax County

Funding enabled the Culmore Clinic to hire a Bilingual Nurse Manager and increase the quality and volume of basic health services it provides to uninsured adults in the Bailey's Crossroads community.

Hepatitis B Initiative of Washington, D.C., \$10,000

Serving All of Northern Virginia

Funding helped reduce the disparity of the Hepatitis B infection among Asian Americans, Pacific Islanders and African Immigrants 65 years and older in Northern Virginia.

Jewish Community Center of Northern Virginia, \$10,000

Serving Fairfax/Arlington

Funding supported the coordination of volunteer, escorted driver services for seniors who are no longer able or comfortable driving to help them maintain their quality of life as they age in place.

Loudoun Citizens for Social Justice/LAWS, \$10,000*

Serving Loudoun County

Funding provided child sexual abuse victims and non-offending family members with vital services to prevent existing trauma from negatively impacting the rest of their lives.

Loudoun Volunteer Caregivers, \$10,000*

Serving Loudoun County

Funding helped provide transportation, financial aid and supportive services for the elderly, disabled and chronically ill in Loudoun County so that they can remain living independently.

New Hope Housing, Inc., \$10,000

Serving Fairfax/Alexandria

Funding provided housing with ongoing support services to assist chronically homeless single adults address their mental health, substance abuse, medical and dental needs.

NOVA ScriptsCentral, \$10,000

Serving All of Northern Virginia

Funding helped provide prescription medications to 3,600 low-income, uninsured children and adults throughout Northern Virginia.

Recovery Program Solutions of Virginia, \$6,702

Serving Arlington/Alexandria

Funding supported the expansion of Arlington Peers Helping Peers for people with mental health, substance abuse, employment and homelessness issues in Arlington and adjacent areas.

The Women's Center, \$9,500

Serving All of Northern Virginia

Funding improved access to high-quality, outcomes-based mental health care for uninsured and underinsured families in crisis and homeless children.

MILITARY PERSONNEL AND FAMILIES FUND -

supports programs that coordinate services between government and nonprofit providers to better serve military families in the Northern Virginia region.

Mental Health Association of Montgomery County - Serving Together, \$33,000

Serving All of Northern Virginia

Funding supported the establishment of a Northern Virginia office for Serving Together to coordinate a network of services available to military veterans and their families in Northern Virginia and to ultimately provide one-on-one navigation support.

POVERTY RELIEF FUND - supports programs that provide assistance to people affected by poverty, including food, shelter, eviction/foreclosure prevention and other emergency assistance.

Action in Community Through Service, \$10,000*

Serving Prince William County

Funding supported the Food Pantry and provided food and toiletries to over 800 low-income families each month in Prince William County.

“Arlington Thrive provides emergency financial assistance to Arlington residents who are facing a short-term crisis and unable to pay for their basic needs. The support of the Community Foundation for Northern Virginia prevented the eviction and subsequent homelessness of 18 households in Arlington County during Fiscal Year 2014.

2013 COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP AWARD *Presented to J. Hamilton Lambert*

The Community Foundation's Community Leadership Award is presented annually for outstanding community service and dedication to improving the quality of life for all Northern Virginians. At the 2013 Sweet Home Virginia Gala, this prestigious award went to J. Hamilton Lambert.

From August of 1980 until December of 1990, J. Hamilton Lambert served in the appointed capacity of County Executive for the County of Fairfax, Virginia. As the County's Chief Administrative Officer, he was responsible for the day-to-day operations of the County with an annual budget of over \$1 billion. During his tenure in this position, Mr. Lambert ensured that Fairfax County maintained a nationally recognized AAA financial rating and received numerous awards from local, state and national organizations.

Upon his retirement from the position of Fairfax County Executive, Mr. Lambert founded J. Hamilton Lambert and Associates to provide a range of customized management and consulting services to governments, businesses and individuals.

J. Hamilton Lambert has devoted much of his life to serving the Northern Virginia community. He has served over thirty organizations, including the George Mason University Foundation (member), Virginia International University (Advisory Board), Center for Excellence in Education – Admiral H. Rickover Foundation (Chairman, Executive Board), Loudoun County Day School (Board of Directors), and Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority (Executive Director, Secretary).

Mr. Lambert has received top honors from numerous organizations for his work in the region. Those awards include Washingtonian of the Year, presented by The Washingtonian magazine; Citizen of the Year,



presented by the Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce; All-Pro Government Management Team, selected by City & State magazine; Resolution by the Virginia Assembly; Metropolitan Washington Professional Engineers Community Service Award, presented by the Metropolitan Washington Chapter of the National Association of Professional Engineers; and Legacy Award from the Military to Medicine Program.

Currently, Mr. Lambert serves as Executive Director of the Claude Moore Charitable Foundation, an organization which invests in community-based nonprofits and educational institutions based in the Commonwealth of Virginia, and is recognized for implementing programs and partnerships aimed at increasing academic competence and encouraging leadership abilities, with an emphasis on the underprivileged.

BECOME A DONOR

Donors can establish funds during their lifetime or as a bequest in their will. Gifts can include cash, cash equivalents, stock, real estate, income from Charitable Remainder Trusts, assets from Charitable Lead Trusts, tangible and intangible property, and other planned gifts including bequests, retirement assets, life insurance policies, pooled income funds, gifts of property with retained life estates, and bargain sales. Choose a fund that works for you.

DONOR FUND OPTIONS

Donor Advised Funds: For as little as \$10,000 you can open a Donor Advised Fund with the Community Foundation. Get an immediate tax deduction for your contribution, then continue to advise the Community Foundation on grant making from the fund. A Donor Advised Fund can be either endowed (limits the amount of grants to 5% of the fund balance each year) or short term (allows the entire balance, principal plus interest, to be granted out at any time).

Field of Interest Funds: By establishing a Field of Interest Fund you can target your gift to address needs in an important area of community life. Your gift stays flexible enough to meet community needs in your interest area – even as they change over time.

Designated Funds: When you open a designated fund at the Community Foundation you identify the organizations to whom grants will be given for the entire duration of your fund.

Scholarship Funds: Establish a scholarship fund with the Community Foundation and provide educational scholarships. With this type of fund you are investing in your community’s future and showing students you care.
